INDEPENDENT EDUCATIONAL EVALUATIONS

We advocate for students to get the right support they need based on these assessments.

SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

Assistance with IEP (Individualized Educational Plans), ARD (Admission, Review, and Dismissal) meetings, and 504 Plans to secure necessary accommodations.

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT AND DISCIPLINARY ISSUES

We provide legal help if a student is not allowed to enroll in school or if there are issues with discipline, like suspensions or expulsions. We also represent students in situations where they might be placed in alternative education programs.

MEDIATION AND DUE PROCESS HEARINGS

We stand up for students in meetings and hearings to help solve problems with schools in a fair way.

ADMINISTRATIVE COMPLAINTS AND APPEALS

We handle the process of filing complaints and appeals under state and federal laws, such as the Disabilities Education Improvement Act, the Americans with Disabilities Act, and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act.

SUPPORT FOR YOUTH AGING OUT OF FOSTER CARE

We provide support for foster youth as they transition to living on their own. We make sure they still get the help they need to succeed in school even as they become more independent.
